Mrs. Devall and Gentlemen:

I am submitting, with my recommendation for approval, the dockets for the following component institutions of The University of Texas for your consideration at the meeting in Austin on February 2 and 3, 1956:

I also recommend approval of the following:

TRANSFERS IN GENERAL REVENUE FUND APPROPRIATIONS: Transfer \$20,000 from U-1736 (All Other General Administrative Salaries) to U-1737 (General Operating Expenses (Including Other Salaries and Wages)). Section 18, j, Article V of the current Appropriation Bill provides for such transfer, and the State Comptroller requires that certificate of Board approval be furnished by the Secretary.

APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR UNIVERSITY'S SHARE OF O.A.S.I. EXPENSE: Pursuant to the provisions of House Bill No. 666, Acts of the 54th Legislature, Regular Session, the University is required to provide appropriations to match employees' contributions under the O.A.S.I. program on all salaries not paid from State's General Revenue Funds. Provide funds needed at this time as follows:

CHANGE ORDER TO CONTRACT WITH NATKIN AND COMPANY FOR AIR CONDITIONING IN HOGG AUDITORIUM AND MODIFICATIONS TO UTILITY SYSTEMS: Authorize Mr. C. H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, to sign and deliver Change Order No. 5 to the contract with Natkin and Company for Air Conditioning in Hogg Auditorium and Modifications to Utility Systems in the amount of \$8,643.23, involving an additional \$1,418.08, and make appropriations to cover this change order as follows from the Unappropriated Balance in the Available University Fund: (1) \$1,418.08 to Account No. 94320 - Air Conditioning in Hogg Auditorium and Modifications to Utility Systems - Natkin and Company Contract, and (2) \$85.08 to Account No. 94322 - Air Conditioning in Hogg Auditorium and Modifications of Utility Systems - Engineering Fees - Zumwalt and Vinther.

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS: Mr. William E. Keys, Director, News and Information Service, February 16-18, 1956, to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, to participate in seminar at District X conference of American College Public Relations Association, expenses to be paid from Maintenance, Equipment and Travel funds of the News Service.

ALLOTMENT ACCOUNT FOR ADMINISTRATION BUILDING AT TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE:
Provide an allotment account for the Administration Building at Texas Western in the amount of \$1,000, funds to come from Unexpended Plant Funds Balance.

ADDITIONAL GIFT TO OLGA KEITH WIESS FUND: In December 1953, Mrs. Olga Keith Wiess donated 900 shares of Humble Oil & Refining Company Capital Stock for the purpose of establishing "The Olga Keith Wiess Fund to Supplement Salaries, Provide Lectureships and Scholarships, and Support Research in the Department of Oto-Rhino-Laryngology in The University of Texas Medical Branch." She stated at that time that the donation was to be used for the purpose of establishing a current restricted fund and that the principal, interest, and/or dividends from the stock could be used for the benefit of the Department of Oto-Rhino-Laryngology. The shares of capital stock were placed on the books in the endowment fund section, and a current restricted fund was set up for income from the stocks with the understanding that all of or any portion of the stock in the endowment fund account could be sold when and if sale should be recommended by the Department of Oto-Rhino-Laryngology, and such recommendation was approved by the administration and Board of Regents.

Under date of December 16, 1955, Mrs. Wiess made an additional contribution of 500 shares of Humble Oil & Refining Company Capital Stock to the Olga Keith Wiess Fund for the same purposes and to be handled in the same way as the stock contributed in 1953. The market value of the stock as of December 16, 1955, was \$106 per share.



McLAUGHLIN FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM AND FEDERAL INCOME TAXES: Some problems have arisen regarding federal income taxes in connection with McLaughlin Fellowships Awards. In order that the Fellowship Fund will not be obligated to reimburse recipients for income tax payments, the Regents' Committee of Award recommends the following procedures in all future McLaughlin Fellowship Awards:

The letters of recommendation from the Medical Branch Advisory Committee to the Regents' Committee of Award and the letters of notification of approval to the recipients from the Medical Branch Business Manager (1) should not contain the words "tax free" after the amount of the stipend, but (2) all letters in both groups should contain this paragraph:

"No income taxes will be deducted from this stipend. It will be the responsibility of the recipient to determine whether or not any income tax is due and pay the taxes that might be due. It is understood that the McLaughlin Fellowship Fund is not committed to pay any income taxes that might result from the receipt of this award."

FRED C. AYER MEMORIAL PUBLICATION FUND: Dr. L. D. Haskey, Dean of the College of Education, has requested authorization for the establishment of the Fred C. Ayer Publication Fund under the following conditions:

The Fund is to be accepted as a Trust Account by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas. The purpose of this Fund is to finance the publication of studies in the field of Education from manuscripts prepared by members of the College of Education faculty or by graduate students in Education, with selection of the study to be published and the publication and distribution thereof under the authority of the Committee on Publications of the College of Education. Each such publication shall bear the imprint, "A Fred C. Ayer Memorial Fund Publication".

The members of the Committee on Publications of the College of Education and the Dean of the College of Education shall serve as Directors of the Fund. Disbursements from the Fund shall be made upon authorization by signature of the Chairman of the Committee on Publication, and counter-signature by the Dean of the College of Education.

Fred C. Ayer Memorial Publication Fund (continued)

Assets of the Fund shall consist of donations made to it, of interest earned from any principal investments, and any receipts from sales of the publications themselves. At the end of the first twelve months of the existence of the Fund, the Director shall decide whether any or all of the assets of the Fund shall be invested under direction of the Board of Regents as a permanent endowment, or whether the assets shall be used to finance publications directly.

To secure donations to the Fund, a Committee of ex-students of the University and of University faculty members is conducting a solicitation by mail and personal appeal.

I recommend approval.

SALE OF LITTLE CAMPUS MOTOR POOL AUTOMOBILES: I recommend ratification of the sale of five vehicles from the Little Campus Motor Pool at a total price of \$1,462.00, the proceeds to be deposited in the Revolving Fund (Account No. 25240) of the Little Campus Motor Pool so that new cars can be purchased for the use of staff who travel regularly under the Extension program. None of the cars sold were bought by University personnel.

CHANGE IN TRUST FUND: On March 24, 1944, the Board of Regents accepted, as trustees, \$3,626.19 and one United States War Savings Bond with a maturity value of \$100.00 for the purpose of establishing The University Memorial Scholarship Fund to provide assistance for former members of the United States Armed Forces. The fund was to be activated upon termination of World War II, and all money to be made available in the form of scholarships within two years thereafter. None of the funds comprising this scholarship account have been awarded, and since the instrument setting up the fund provides that the ". . . trustees, acting by a majority vote and with the approval of the Committee of Award, may designate another purpose . . . and the purpose so designated shall thereupon become the purpose of the trust," the Committee recommends that the money be transferred to another similar account known as The Texas Veterans of World War II Memorial Scholarship Fund, the purpose of which is to provide assistance to the widows or children of deceased or disabled Texas veterans of World War II, the fund to become operative beginning September 1, 1960. I recommend approval.

MILITARY LEAVE: I recommend approval of a military leave for Mr. F. C. McConnell, Director, Division of Housing & Food Service, for a fifteen day period beginning March 2, 1956.

CONTRACTS: The following contracts have been executed at the Main University by the University official indicated. I recommend approval and ratification of signatures:

1. Contract with W. D. Anderson Company, Austin, signed by Business Manager Graves W. Landrum, providing for the resurfacing of the present Penick Tennis Courts and the construction of a new singles one at a cost of \$15,511, funds to come from the Athletic Council General Account.
2. Contract with Maufrais Brothers, Inc., Austin, signed by Business Manager Graves W. Landrum, providing for the construction of a bridge across Waller Creek between the University Tea House and Simkins Hall, at a cost of \$3,000. Mr. Landrum has also signed a change order with Maufrais Brothers, Inc., to delete the contingency item of \$250, making the University's commitment to the contractor \$2,750, the amount previously approved for the construction of the bridge.

I recommend your approval and ratification of signatures:

1. Change Order No. 11 to Contract AF 18(600)-87, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, extends the contract period to February 28, 1956 without an increase in the contract price. The research on fire control systems analysis continues under the direction of Dr. M. Y. Colby, Professor of Physics and Executive Director, Military Physics Research Laboratory.
2. Change Order No. 13 to Contract AF 18(600)-113, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, extends the contract period through December 31, 1956, without an increase in the contract funds. The research on development of recording microwave refractometers continues under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering and Director, Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory.
3. Change Order No. 10 to Contract AF 33(616)-313, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, extends the contract period to February 28, 1956 without an increase in the contract price. The research continues under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics and Director, Defense Research Laboratory.
4. Supplemental Agreement No. 8 to Contract AF 19(604)-494, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Cambridge Research Center, adds the sum of \$28,100.00 to the contract funds, amends the scope of the work, and extends the contract period through November 30, 1956. The research on measurement and analysis of refractive index of the atmosphere continues under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering and Director, Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory.
5. Supplemental Agreement No. 6 to Contract AF 18(600)-618, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Research and Development Command, Randolph Field, adds the sum of \$19,425.00 to the contract funds, amends the scope of the work, and extends the contract period through October 31, 1957. The study of a photosynthetic gas exchanger as a method of providing for the respiratory requirements of the human in a sealed chamber continues under the direction of Dr. Jack Myers, Professor of Zoology and Director, Laboratory of Algal Physiology.
6. Supplemental Agreement No. 8 to Contract AF 18(600)-647, by which the Department of the Air Force, Arnold Engineering Development Center, changes the citation of funds and amends the scope of the work. The research on aerodynamics continues under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics and Director, Defense Research Laboratory.
7. Supplemental Agreement No. 3 to Contract AF 18(600)-913, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Research and Development Command, Lackland Air Force Base, incorporates the 1954 overhead rate of 43.54% of salaries into the contract as a fixed rate for the period January 1, 1955 through July 15, 1955. The research on anxiety-tolerance studies was conducted in the Psychological Research Foundation under the direction of Dr. Philip Worchel, Professor of Psychology.
8. The research and development of synthetic group procedures for use in classification and screening continues under the direction of Dr. R. R. Blake, Associate Professor of Psychology and Director, Psychological Research Foundation.

9. Change Order No. 6 to Contract AF 33(616)-2673, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, deletes Part IX - Allowable Item of Cost clause previously incorporated in the contract by Supplemental Agreement No. 5. The research on supersonic wind tunnels continues under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics and Director, Defense Research Laboratory.
10. Supplemental Agreement No. 7 to Contract AF 33(616)-2673, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, adds the sum of \$17,000.00 to the contract funds, amends the scope of the work, and extends the contract period through September 30, 1956. The research on supersonic wind tunnels continues under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics and Director, Defense Research Laboratory.
11. Supplemental Agreement No. 2 to Contract AF 33(600)-28069, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Materiel Command, extends the contract period to April 1, 1956 without an increase in contract funds. The study and fabrication of dynamic tester for fire control systems continues under the direction of Dr. M. Y. ESTABLISHMENT OF DIVISION OF HOUSING AND FOOD SERVICE - RESERVE FUND:

On recommendation of Mr. Graves W. Landrum, Business Manager, concurred in by Dr. J. C. Dolley, Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs, I recommend the creation of a reserve fund for the Division of Housing and Food Service into which will be transferred at the end of each fiscal year all the cash overdraft balances and ninety percent of the remaining cash balances at August 31 in those Division of Housing and Food Service Operating accounts not pledged for debt service on revenue bonds, and the entire cash balances of any operating account that becomes inactive. To establish the fund a general ledger account is to be set up in the Auxiliary Enterprises section of Main University accounts entitled "Division of Housing and Food Service - Major Repairs, Remodeling and Replacement, and Operating Reserve Fund." Two thirds of the balance in this fund is to be invested in short term United States Government securities, the income to accrue to the fund. To be transferred to this fund immediately are the investments presently owned by the University Cafeteria, totaling some \$246,948.19, and August 31, 1955 balances from various funds of this Division totaling \$437,633.33. It is further recommended that one of these latter accounts "University Residence Halls - Vending Machine Concessions" be discontinued at the end of the present fiscal year, the income, effective September 1, 1956, to be handled as an income item for each operating unit and budgeted to the operating account earning the income.

PURCHASE FROM A STAFF MEMBER: I recommend that approval be given the Department of Art to purchase from Mr. Luis Eades, Instructor in that Department, at a cost of \$23.00, twenty-three kodachrome color slides which he made in Honduras. The pictures are of Honduranian painting and architecture available at no other source. The slides would go into the regular collection of the Department to be used in courses in art history, especially in Latin American art.

The Laboratory Technician I classification is for non-registered Technicians having qualifying education and experience.

The Laboratory Technician II classification is for registered Technicians.

The Laboratory Technician III classification is for registered Technicians serving as heads of sections in the Laboratory with supervisory responsibilities and teaching.

The Laboratory Technician IV classification is for the assistant head laboratory Technician position including responsibility for sections of the laboratory not having a Laboratory Technician III supervising the functions of the section. This classification will also have a supervisory function in the training program for student Technicians.

REVISION IN SICK LEAVE POLICY: I recommend that the following revision in the sick leave policy be approved as an amendment to the policies and rules for the classified service of the institution:

8.2 Sick Leave

8.21 An employee is entitled to sick leave with pay after he has been employed for six full months. Sick leave with pay shall be allowed each regular salaried employee at the rate of one working day for each full month of service, starting with the seventh month of employment. Employees will not receive payment for unused allowance of sick leave at the time of separation. Sick leave may be approved only to cover absences necessitated by personal sickness or injury or exposure to contagious disease which requires quarantine or isolation.

8.22 After six full months of employment, sick leave may be accumulated to a maximum period of sixty calendar days. When an employee is incapacitated by injury or illness and the remaining staff of the section or department is able to carry the work load, accumulated sick leave with pay may be granted.

8.23 In order to be eligible for allowance of sick leave the employee must comply with the following:

8.231 Report promptly by telephone to his supervisory officer on the first day of absence.

8.232 Keep his supervisory officer informed of his condition, as required by him, if the absence is for more than one day.

8.233 Sick leave with pay shall be granted only when the employee applies for it through his supervisory officer and meets all eligibility requirements set forth herein. The supervisory officer may require a doctor's certificate if he so desires before taking action on any sick leave request.

8.234 Provisions of workmen's compensation legislation as applied to the University system shall govern use of sick leave with pay where such legislation is controlling.

8.235 Malingering and other abuses of sick leave privileges shall constitute grounds for dismissal from employment.


